



Seven Spooky Season Story Starters for Students



Sometimes it's fun to write a scary story. It's like riding a rollercoaster. You get some thrills, but know that you're safe. Lots of people want to write a spooky story but don't know where to begin. Here are some ideas to help you get started.

Each page has a space for an illustration, a story idea, and a few lines to get you started, then you can finish it on other pages.

Here are a few tips for writing scary stories...

- Take your time! I know it's exciting to get to the scary stuff, but if you don't take the time to let the readers get to know, and get to like the main character, then they won't care as much when the scary stuff starts to happen.
- If you're stuck, ask yourself, "What is something that could happen that would make things harder, but not hopeless for my character?"
- Remember, you may have every detail pictured in your mind, but the reader doesn't. Make sure you describe things so that the reader has the picture in their head that you intended.
- Describe things using at least three of the five senses. If a zombie is shambling towards the main character, don't just say how gross it looks. Describe how creepy its groans are and how nasty it smells.
- Monsters can represent the theme. Think of a big idea that frightens your main character, and have the monster be a reflection of that. So if my main character is scared of how many gray hairs he's getting now that he's not a kid anymore, a vampire that doesn't age would be a monster with a great thematic connection.
